Window Replacement Project Authorized

At our October Voters' Meeting, voters approved the Window Replacement plan. This involves replacement of the remaining 21 pairs of windows located around the church. The first two sets of windows located in the kitchen were installed during the first week of October. The committee will coordinate with the installer to formulate an order to schedule to properly time delivery of the windows and minimize the



need for storage prior to installation. Sufficient funds have been identified from long-range planning and other sources to cover the cost of the windows. Fundraising efforts will continue in hopes of raising the remaining funds necessary to cover installation costs. To date,

about 12% of our \$30,000 goal has been raised. Any contribution is welcome. If you'd like to sponsor a window at a particular location in the church, the various options for doing that are listed on the posterboard in the narthex. Our windows have served a long life but now must be replaced to keep both heating and cooling expenses in check. If you can contribute to this campaign, a donation of any size would be appreciated.

New Roof is Underway



The materials for our flat roof arrived on October 12th, and the crew arrived on October 19th to begin complete removal of the old roof and

installation of all new materials. Once the flat roof has been replaced, the same crew is planning to install the new steel shingled roof over the sanctuary. We will be mildly inconvenienced by a large trailer, dumpster, and drivable lift that are all parked on the far east end of the parking lot. These items should not have a significant impact on parking on Sundays because that space has rarely been needed for parking. Barring rainy weather, the complete project is expected to be complete in 3 weeks or roughly by Election Day, November 7th. During the week, there will occasionally be cones set out to define the work area, so please stay clear for your own safety. The roofers know that our primary entrance is the east entrance so they will ensure access to it is preserved. If you have any questions or concerns about the roofing project as it progresses, please direct them to Rick Schiller.
